Independence Day celebration in Spring Hill** ★

The City of Spring Hill wants everyone to enjoy Independence Day in a safe, responsible and lawful manner. Please respect your neighborhood and clean up after your celebration. Remember, there are those who may choose not to celebrate with fireworks. Please try to respect those individuals as well as neighborhood pets who may be affected.



**In 2021, fireworks may be lit from
Friday, July 2 through Monday,
July 5 from 8 a.m. to 11 p.m.**

Fireworks can be purchased June 27 through July 5. To light fireworks, you must be at least 18 years old or under adult supervision.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Where can I not light fireworks?

Fireworks should not be lit in any gathering of people; in public parks, including golf courses, and public parking lots of the city; within any building; and in, under, or from a car or vehicle whether moving or standing still.

What should I do with unlit fireworks and debris?

For safety purposes — and to keep our community looking tidy — all unfired fireworks and debris should be immediately cleaned up, removed from any adjacent right-of-way and disposed of in a nonflammable container.

What is the safest way to light fireworks?

Fireworks with projectiles that shoot into the air should be directed so the projectile does not fire over any building or person.

Should I have a fire extinguisher nearby?

At least one approved fire extinguisher is required at the exhibition site.

Can I drink alcohol while lighting fireworks?

No. You may not light fireworks while under the influence of alcohol or other substances that may impair judgment.

Can I buy or light fireworks during a burn ban?

The use of fireworks is prohibited in the event of a burn ban or declaration of an emergency. The sale of fireworks is still allowed during a burn ban.

Are there penalties for not following fireworks regulations?

Yes. Violations of the ordinance pertaining to the lighting of fireworks (Chapter VI, Articles 1 and 2) are a Class C offense and carry penalties up to \$500 plus any cost for fighting fires or responding to other emergencies resulting from the violation. In addition, each day the violation continues is a separate offense.
